Paul Dumouchel is professor of philosophy at the Graduate School of Core Ethics and Frontier Sciences, Ritsumeikan University, Kyoto, Japan, author of *The Ambivalence of Scarcity and Other Essays* (Michigan State University Press, 2014), *The Barren Sacrifice* (Michigan State University Press, 2015). With Reiko Gotoh he edited *Against Injustice: The New Economics of Amartya Sen* (Cambridge University Press, 2009) and *Social Bonds as Freedom* (Berghahn Books, 2015). His most recent book, with Luisa Damiano, is *Living with robots* (Harvard University Press, 2017).

Robert Manning authored two books: *Interpreting Otherwise Than Heidegger: The Challenge of Emmanuel Levinas' Ethics as First Philosophy* and *Beyond Ethics to Justice: The Legacy of Emmanuel Levinas and Jacques Derrida*. He also authored several articles in major journals such as *The Journal of Religion*, *Philosophy Today*, *The Graduate Faculty Philosophy Journal*. Robert is a Professor of Philosophy at Quincy University (Quincy, IL, USA) and an adjunct professor of philosophy in the graduate program in Philosophical Counseling at the West University of Timisoara (Romania). His research interests are primarily in contemporary European and American philosophy, gender studies and feminist theory, and Holocaust and Genocide Studies.
